The Department of Forensic and Investigative Science at West Virginia University invites applications for a Teaching Assistant Professor position beginning August 2019. The successful candidate will teach courses including, but not limited to, crime scene investigation, latent fingerprints, microscopy, and forensic photography and serve as an academic advisor to our undergraduate majors. The teaching load is 4 courses or course-equivalents per semester; advising responsibilities may be counted as course-equivalents. Teaching faculty appointments at WVU are full-time, promotable, non-tenure track, renewable-term appointments with no limit on the number of terms. Qualifications include (1) a PhD in forensic science or a closely allied natural science or an MS in forensic science with at least two years of documented experience in teaching or forensic work directly related to this position's teaching requirements; (2) teaching and mentoring abilities in forensic science; and (c) knowledge of current forensic science education and practice, including accreditation standards.

Our department is accredited by the Forensic Science Education Programs Accreditation Commission (FEPAC) and offers 3 forensic undergraduate majors (examination, biology, chemistry), a minor, an MS, and a PhD. Our Carnegie Classification is "Doctoral Universities: Highest Research Activity." We are the only such research-intensive university that offers all three degrees (BS-MS-PhD) in forensic science. The department is housed in a recently renovated building with state-of-the-art teaching facilities, a crime scene house complex that includes three houses, a forensic garage, ballistics facility and a forensic photography laboratory.
